Mediation and Reconciliation in the Context of War, Prison and Political Aggression

Acts of aggression carried out on a political scale often result in cultural conflicts such as those in Northern Ireland, the label of terrorism and its victims such as the September 11 attacks in the United States, and the individual trauma of human beings living through war. Restorative dialogue and the principles of restorative justice have value and application in all of these situations. This one day training will explore the principles VOMA espouses related to conflicts of this nature and build a foundation of basic skills needed to use the processes of mediation and restorative dialogue on personal, community, and political levels, in the context of war, prison and political aggression.

Participants will:

- Become familiar with VOMA and the basic principles of restorative justice
- Explore the application of mediation processes and RJ principles in the contexts of political aggression and war
- Practice basic skills related to the process and practice of restorative dialogue on personal, community and political levels.
